Cooperative Extension Program

- The Cooperative Extension Program at Prairie View A&M University in the College of Agriculture and Human Sciences is supported by the National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA).
- Through a well-organized network of professional educators and more than 4,000 trained volunteers, the Prairie View A&M University Cooperative Extension Program delivers practical research-based knowledge to small farm producers, families, aspiring entrepreneurs and youth.
- It works with people in 35 Texas counties. Many of them have limited personal or family assets, limited opportunities or they come from communities that have limited resources.







Children's Nutrition Research Center

- The Children's Nutrition Research Center is administered within the Department of Pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in cooperation with Texas Children's Hospital and partially supported by the USDA Agricultural Research Service (ARS).
- It is one of six USDA human nutrition research centers conducting scientific investigations designed to provide Americans with a clear understanding of the role of nutrition in maintaining a healthy, active life.
- Areas of study:
 - Nutritional metabolism in mothers, infants, and children
 - Pediatric clinical nutrition
 - Obesity prevention
 - Identify behavioral and environmental factors that influence the development of children's eating habits and how to best help children and families adopt healthier habits
 - Developmental determinants of obesity in infants and children
 - Molecular, cellular and regulatory aspects of nutrition during development

Collaboration

- Cooperative Extension Program at Prairie View A&M University and the Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine have been collaborating for over 7 years
