In the **next 5 years**, Michigan's food system will most need employees in:



Manufacturing and Processing avg. earnings: \$55,189 per year



Wholesale Distribution avg. earnings: \$64,889 per year



Retail Sales avg. earnings: \$25,738 per year

These are the **biggest challenges** to filling local and regional food systems jobs:



Employers find that applicants:

- lack workplace skills, especially communication, work ethic, and reliability
- have transportation challenges
- lack work experience

Applicants lack training in:

- customer service
- operations
- food safety and handling
- safety procedures
- inventory management



Employers have difficulty offering competitive wages and benefits.



Many food systems jobs **require no more than a high school diploma**, but few K-12 schools offer food related training and education opportunities.
