## There are jobs to fill in Michigan's local and regional food system.

We surveyed and interviewed local and regional food system employers to better understand employment, skill shortages and critical factors impacting current and future workforce demand.

**41%** of employers currently have job openings.

86% of food system employers anticipate hiring at least 1 new worker by 2021.

**14**% of respondents hire all full-time employees.

- **10**% hire all part-time.

The rest hire a mix of fulland part-time workers.

## But there are challenges:



Pool of candidates lacks workplace skills (31%), transportation (26%) and previous work experience (19%).



Employers have difficulty offering competitive wages (36%) or benefits (32%).

## Workplace skills that are hard to find include:

- Communication (23%)
- Work ethic (19%)
- Reliability (17%)

Many employers hire workers without food system skills or experience and train them on the job.

## The most needed trainings for food system skill development include:



- Day-to-day operations
- Food handling
- Safety procedures
- Sales and marketing
- Customer service



- Machine operation
- Organic farming
- Animal handling
- Trade skills
