Guidelines for Virtual 4-H Shooting Sports Activities



For the safety of our 4-H members and volunteers, the Michigan 4-H Shooting Sports program follows stringent guidelines and training structures set by both the National and Michigan 4-H programs. During this period of virtual programming, 4-H youth and volunteers are reminded that 4-H Shooting Sports activities that require handling of shooting equipment cannot be performed without the physical, inperson presence of our certified coaches. Alternative suggested activities for virtual programming are listed below.

Without the <u>in-person</u> presence of a certified 4-H Shooting Sports instructor, 4-H members are:
