











THE SITE







SUN PATTERNS




Sun patters are an important factor in determining views and location of buildings. A naturally open site, allows for opportunity with building placement and site amenities to create and control the areas of shade and sun exposure across the site. The changes in sun position can allow for a dynamic space that always seems to be changing with its environment.
